(Romans 5:6-11)

6 For when we were yet without strength, in due time Christ died for the ungodly.

7 For scarcely for a righteous man will one die: yet peradventure for a good man some would even dare to die.

8 But God commendeth his love toward us, in that, while we were yet sinners, Christ died for us.

9 Much more then, being now justified by his blood, we shall be saved from wrath through him.

10 For if, when we were enemies, we were reconciled to God by the death of his Son, much more, being reconciled,

we shall be saved by his life.

11 And not only so, but we also joy in God through our Lord Jesus Christ, by whom we have now received the atonement.

Getting to Know Him

have examined some of the words used. Verse eight of our text says, "God commendeth His love toward us..." Commend means to commit, entrust or give for care or preservation, to recommend or present as worthy. In our text, it comes from a word which means to place together, or to introduce one to another. I've seen paraphrases (probably coming from modern translations which I care not to research) saying, "God demonstrated His love to us..." This completely looses the original meaning which is so beautifully preserved in our King James Bible. God did much more than merely demonstrate, or show us His love so we could see it. He has placed us and His love together; He has introduced His love to us and us to His love. The act of His love was much more than a demonstration to see; His love was applied to us and we were placed in His love. He commended His love toward us. introduced to someone is the first step toward getting to know them. This passage is all about getting to know Him and getting to know His love for us. It tells us what He has done to form this new relationship with Him.

Our lost condition is described in verse six as without strength and as the ungodly. What a sad and hopeless description this is, to be ungodly or without God. condition shows us as alienated from God. To take the word "Godly," which means, "to be of God, Like God, having to do with God, etc." then using the simplest way of negating this meaning to say it is just not so, describes one who is hopelessly separated from God. Verse ten even says we were the enemies of God in this state. Thinking of all this means for a lost sinner to be "Ungodly," I certainly

wish to do all I can as a redeemed believer to not be ungodly and separate from all that is ungodly. This, however, is not our message at this moment. We are looking at what God did for us and getting to know Him. Verse six says while we were ungodly, He died for us, and verse eight says while we were yet sinners, Christ died for us. Why would one do such a thing. Who would do such a thing. Verse seven marvels at this and verse eight gives the answer: He did so to commend His love toward us; He did it because He loves us. While getting to know Him, we learn as His enemy, He is love! John wrote, "He that loveth not knoweth not God; for God is love" (1 John 4:8). He later wrote, "And we have known and believed the love that God hath to us. God is love: and he that dwelleth in love dwelleth in God, and God in him" (1 John 4:16). John sums up what we see in our text as he speaks of knowing God and dwelling in God and He in us. God made this so when He commended His love toward us. God never asked or commanded us to do anything that Jesus as a man was not willing to do Himself. Jesus commanded us to love our enemies and here we see Jesus loved us while we were truly His enemies.

This is not all, because verse nine says, "Much more then..." letting us know it gets even better. If He loved us enough to die for us when we were His enemies, what should we expect from Him as His friends. Yes, now we are His friends because we have been reconciled to Him. Though once alienated from God as the ungodly, we are now reconciled or reunited to God with a relationship with Him as man had before the fall of Adam, which is discussed in the verses following our text. With this new relationship or friendship,

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we should expect much more than He did while we were His enemies. Paul said, "Being now justified by his blood, we shall be saved from wrath through him." We were justified by His blood in His death, but Paul said, "We shall be saved by his life." Our sin debt was settled in His death, but what is to come, what He shall do for us as His friend will come through His life. through His victory over death and His resurrected life that He gives us new life. Here we learn that as His Friend, He is Life! Jesus said, "I am come that they might have life, and that they might have it more abundantly" (John 10:10). I wish I had time and space to expound on this unending theme, but I must move on.

You'd think this were enough, but verse eleven says, "And not only so..." revealing to us even more good news to getting to know Him and His love. We are told, "We also joy in God through our Lord Jesus Christ, by whom we have now received the atonement." We have joy in God which is given to us through our Lord. It is through our Lord that we have received the atonement. Again, we often see the Word of God attacked as many criticize our King James Bible claiming the word "Atonement" is incorrectly translated here. Being as kind and eloquent as I can, I must

say that is a stupid assessment. There is no better word possible for We all understand that this text. atonement in the Old Testament is a different process than the atonement given by Christ, but it fulfills the same end, which is atonement, only more so being complete, perfect, final and everlasting. The word "Atone" is literally formed from the two words "At one." This is not just a catchy definition, it is the true etymology of the word meaning to be made "At one" or to be united together. Whether through the putting off of a sin debt in the Old Testament, or and eradication of the sin debt through the blood of Jesus Christ, reconciliation still means to receive atonement or to be united with God and our Lord Jesus Christ. This is being placed together with Him in a partnership. Though we are joint heirs with Him in this partnership, we still realize this is a partnership in which we are His servant and He is our Lord as our text calls Him. Here we learn as being reconciled to Him. He is **Lord!** Getting to know Him as Lord is a true joy. We have a Master who really does care about us.

The more I get to know Him, the more I know... 1. As His enemy, He is Love; 2. As His Friend, He is Life; 3. Being reconciled to Him, He is Lord.
